

Professor Richard W. Hu is Director of the Master of International & Public Affairs (MIPA) program at the University of Hong Kong (HKU), and teaches international relations and East Asian politics in the HKU's Department of Politics & Public Administration. Professor Hu completed his undergraduate degree in international politics at Peking University, China, and received an M.A. in international relations from the Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS), and Ph.D. degree in political science from University of Maryland, College Park in the United States. He taught different U.S. universities (including University of California-San Diego, Monterey Institute of International Studies, and University of Detroit) before he joined the faculty of the University of Hong Kong in 1997. Professor Hu was a John M. Olin Fellow in National Security Studies at the Harvard University in 1991-92 and an IGCC Postdoctoral Fellow in the University of California's Institute of Global Conflict & Cooperation in 1992-93. His teaching and research interests focus on international security, East Asian international relations, China's foreign policy, and cross-Strait relations. He has published widely in international academic journals. His latest publications include a co-authored book *Building a Neighbourly Community: Post-cold war China, Japan, and Southeast Asia* (Manchester University Press/Palgrave, 2006).
