

**Suisheng Zhao** is Professor and Executive Director of the Center for China-US Cooperation at Graduate School of International Studies, University of Denver. He is founder and editor of the *Journal of Contemporary China*, a member of the Board of Governors of the US Committee of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific (USCSCAP), a member of National Committee on US-China Relations, and a Research Associate at the Fairbank Center for East Asian Research in Harvard University. A Campbell National Fellow at Hoover Institution of Stanford University, he was Associate Professor of Political Science/International Studies at Washington College in Maryland, Associate Professor of Government/East Asian Politics at Colby College in Maine and visiting assistant professor at the Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies, University of California-San Diego. He received a Ph.D. degree in political science from the University of California-San Diego, a M.A. degree in Sociology from the University of Missouri and a M.A. degree in economics from Peking University. He is the author and editor of eight books. His most recent books are *Debating Political Reform in China: Rule of Law versus Democratization* (M. E. Sharpe, 2006), *A Nation-State by Construction: Dynamics of Modern Chinese Nationalism* (Stanford University Press, 2004), *Chinese Foreign Policy: Pragmatism and Strategic Behavior* (M. E. Sharpe, 2003), *China and Democracy: Reconsidering the Prospects for a Democratic China* (Routledge, 2000), *Across the Taiwan Strait: Mainland China, Taiwan, and the Crisis of 1995-96* (Routledge, 1999). In addition, his forthcoming book, *The Rise of China and Transformation of US-China Relations*, will be published by Routledge in 2007. His articles have appeared in *Political Science Quarterly*, *The Wilson Quarterly*, *Washington Quarterly*, *International Politik*, *The China Quarterly*, *World Affairs*, *Asian Survey*, *Asian Affairs*, *Journal of Democracy*, *Pacific Affairs*, *Communism and Post-Communism Studies*, *Problems of Post-Communism*, *Issues and Studies*, and elsewhere.
